TERESA POTTER brings 24 years of teaching to the education profession. She is currently employed as a gifted education teacher at Fisher Elementary in Moore. Besides her day job, Teresa facilitates workshops for the Oklahoma Alliance for Geography Education, Oklahoma A+ Schools, and the Aerospace Industry Partnership. In 2001, she was given the honor of becoming a peer facilitator and subsequently a Master Teacher for the Colonial Williamsburg Teacher

Institute. Mrs. Potter participated in "Bill of Rights Day" in 2000 and has been directing Colonial Day at the Capitol for 13 years. She also became a facilitator for Team Washington with Mount Vernon in 2010. Teresa has done historical interpretation for Colonial Day at the Capitol, The Sons of the American Revolution, The Daughters of the American Revolution and in schools around Oklahoma City. She has won numerous awards in education to include the Gilder Lehrman History Teacher of the Year (2014), The Nystrom/Herff Jones Geography Award (2011), The Oklahoma Medal for Excellence in Elementary Education Award (2011), The Oklahoma Humanities Council Humanities in Education Award (2009), the Moore Public Schools District Teacher of the Year (2008), and the Oklahoma Foundation for Excellence Distinguished Service Award (2007).

TERESA POTTER is portraying AGENT 355. One of the most captivating and controversial parts of the Culper Spy Ring's history is Agent 355, Woodhull's possible female recruit. Many intelligence historians consider her one of this country's first female undercover operations officers. Still others refer to her as the "hidden daughter of the American Revolution." While defending against British transgressions in and around New York, George Washington came to rely heavily on the information she supplied him. But even today, she is known only by the designation "355," the code-number for "lady" in an encryption system used by the famous Culper Ring.
