Featured Program Women in the Military



Women's flying heritage is filled with dynamic personalities who have charted the course to modern aviation.

Amy Johnson, above, was a pioneer English aviatrix who was born in 1903. She was the first female to solo fly from England to Australia in 1930. During World War II, Johnson joined the ATA in ferrying planes around England. She died while on a transport assignment in 1941.

Six Foreign-Born Patriots 2. Casimir Pulaski

Polish-born Casimir Pulaski spent his brief life fighting as a revolutionary on two separate continents. The man later called the "Father of the American Cavalry" first distinguished himself as a leader of the Bar Confederation, a band of nobles who fought against foreign domination of Poland.

After being exiled from his homeland in the early 1770s, he made his way to France and came into contact with Benjamin

Franklin. Mindful that England had recommended that Poland be partitioned by her hostile neighbors in 1772, Pulaski enthusiastically responded to Franklin's plea for assistance.

The dashing young officer immediately proved his value in his first engagement at September 1777's Battle of Brandywine, where he led a rearguard action that helped cover General George Washington's retreat.

In 1895, the removal of a Confederate statue in Charlotte, Virginia, sparked a torch-light rally by white nationalists resulting in a fire at the University of Virginia campus, destroying a collection of library books which were initially collected from a list of 7,000 books drafted by President Jefferson. A law librarian at the university, 40 years ago, started re-creating the collection of legal texts Jefferson recommended. Since then, the university has collected 336 of the 375 tomes and will soon be publishing the collection online for free access.
